

Turkey Hunting Guide

Introduction

The restoration of the wild turkey is one of the great wildlife success stories in Indiana.

Wild turkeys were once a food source for American Indians and later for pioneers, who found the bird in abundance. There are even written accounts of Abraham Lincoln's prowess in hunting them during his boyhood years in southern Indiana.

But uncontrolled subsistence and market hunting, and habitat loss from deforestation across much of the landscape completely wiped out turkeys in Indiana by 1900.

The Department of Conservation, predecessor to the current Department of Natural Resources, launched an effort to restore wild turkeys to Indiana in 1956, with an emphasis on releasing only wild-trapped birds.

In the early years of the project, wild turkeys were obtained from Missouri, but wildlife biologists perfected trapping techniques and began to trap wild birds within the state and relocate them to other areas of the Indiana. From 1956 to 2004, almost 2,800 wild-trapped birds were released at 185 sites.

Wild turkeys now exist across Indiana. Their population growth has been paralleled by growing interest in hunting them.

The first wild turkey hunting season in Indiana was in 1970. It lasted only four days in three counties. Sixty-two hunters participated, and their harvest total was just six birds.

Spring hunting for only gobblers now occurs statewide. The bag limit is one bird.

When all-day hunting was initiated in 2002, the annual harvest topped 10,000 for the first time ... and has remained above that mark ever since.

After setting a spring harvest record of 13,742 turkeys in 2010, hunters harvested 11,669 birds in 2011. It was a 15 percent drop from the record year but still fifth-best among all years for spring turkey hunting in Indiana. Hunter success rate in 2011 was approximately 21 percent, which was slightly less than recent years and can be attributed largely to inclement weather and flooding.

Youth hunters harvested 971 turkeys during the special two-day spring season in 2011, compared to 1,554 in 2010.

Thanks to continuous research by DNR wildlife biologists and financial contributions of license-buying hunters, it's a safe bet that wild turkeys are here to stay.

Your License Dollars

You open your wallet, pull out cash or a credit card, and shell out your hard-earned dollars for an Indiana fishing, hunting or trapping license.

What does the purchase get you?

Well, besides the opportunity to pursue your favorite outdoor activities, it grants you the privilege of standing shoulder to shoulder with generations of others who staked out a legacy as America's first conservationists.

From the days of Theodore Roosevelt and fellow conservation pioneers, Americans have enjoyed the fruits of a user-pay, user-play approach known as the North American Model for Wildlife Conservation and based on the premise that fish and wildlife belong to the public.

With this concept, fish and wildlife management and public access are funded by license revenue. No license money goes to the state general fund.

But it doesn't stop there.

Indiana's conservation efforts get additional support from two federal funds – the Sport Fish Restoration and Wildlife Restoration programs, sometimes referred to respectively as the Dingell-Johnson Fund and the Pittman-Robertson Fund. Administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, these two programs collect excise taxes on sporting arms and ammunition, archery equipment, fishing equipment, and motor boat fuels. The money is distributed among state fish and wildlife agencies based on land size and the number of licensed anglers and hunters in each state.

In 2010, Indiana received more than \$8 million from the Wildlife Restoration Program and more than \$5 million from the Sport Fish Restoration Program.

Here's another way of putting it – for each hunting license sold in Indiana, the DNR received an additional \$30 in Wildlife Restoration Program funds. For each fishing license, it was nearly \$11.

The combination of license revenue and federal dollars fueled a funding engine that helped the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife open Wabashiki Fish and Wildlife Area near Terre Haute and Deer Creek Fish and Wildlife Area in Putnam County, and convert Roush Lake near Huntington from a DNR State Parks & Reservoir property to a Fish & Wildlife Area.

...fish and wildlife management and public access are funded by license revenue.

The combined projects increased public land available for fishing, hunting and trapping by more than 10,000 acres.

Other recent conservation projects that your license dollars support include:

- Research projects on quail and rabbit reproduction, disease monitoring of white-tailed deer, fall quail covey counts; mourning dove trapping and banding;
 - Completion of a waterfowl refuge area at Kankakee Fish and Wildlife Area;
 - Construction of an auxiliary boat ramp at Falls of the Ohio State Park;
 - Providing wildlife habitat management information to more than 1,000 private land-owners;
 - Development of new angler and boating access sites at Sugar Creek (Montgomery County), Williams Lake (Noble), Kekionga Lake (Adams), Eco Park (Jennings), and the St. Joseph River (DeKalb). The five sites were added to more than 350 existing access sites across the state;
 - Comprehensive study of bass populations at Brookville Reservoir;
 - Trapping and banding of more than 1,000 wood ducks on DNR properties to assist waterfowl biologists in determining production in Indiana;
 - Sponsorship of dozens of hunter recruitment/retention events on fish and wildlife properties in conjunction with youth seasons;
 - Upgrades to several fish and wildlife areas, including Crosley (added 15-yard lane to shooting range and succession habitat control); Glendale (improvements to Horsehoe and Wren ponds, reclamation of old fields, aquatic weed treatment to Dogwood Lake); revitalization of Rail Marsh, expansion of Weyerbacher Marsh (Hovey Lake); Wilbur Wright (covered firing point at shooting range).
- So, the next time you buy a fishing, hunting or trapping license, know that your investment is going a long way to help conservation of our natural resources.

Hunting Regulations

The following is a summary of Indiana regulations related to turkey hunting. It is designed as a service to sportsmen and women and is not intended to be a complete digest of all regulations.

License requirements: To hunt wild turkey, Indiana residents need a resident turkey hunting license and a valid game bird habitat stamp privilege. Those that have a lifetime comprehensive hunting, lifetime comprehensive hunting and fishing, or youth hunt/trap license can hunt turkey and do not need to purchase the game bird habitat stamp because it is included with those license types. A separate turkey hunting license is required when hunting during each turkey hunting season - one for the spring season and one for the fall season. Game bird habitat stamp privileges are good for both spring and fall seasons in the same calendar year.

Non-resident hunters wishing to hunt turkeys in Indiana must purchase a non-resident turkey license and a game bird habitat stamp. In addition, if an Indiana resident is required to purchase another license in order to hunt turkeys in a non-resident's state, the non-resident must purchase an annual non-resident hunting license in order to hunt turkeys in Indiana. Here are the license requirements for residents of surrounding states:

Illinois, Kentucky and Ohio residents must purchase an annual non-resident hunting license, a non-resident turkey license and a game bird habitat stamp.

Wisconsin and Michigan residents must purchase a non-resident turkey license and a game bird habitat stamp.

Resident status: A resident is a person whose true fixed and permanent home and principal residence has been in Indiana for 60 consecutive days prior to purchasing a license or permit and who does not claim residency for fishing, hunting or trapping in another state or country. All others are non-residents.

How to buy a license: The DNR provides four convenient ways to purchase a license.

Include the following information:

- Specify the license(s) and season (i.e., deer muzzleloader)
- Name, date of birth, Indiana Driver's License number or Social Security number
- Hunter education certificate number if born after Dec. 31, 1986
- Complete address, city, state, ZIP and phone number
- Height, weight, color of hair and color of eyes
- Please allow 2-3 weeks for delivery.

License exemptions: The following are exempt from license requirements:

- Landowners or lessees of farmland who farm that land and are residents of Indiana, their spouses and children living with them, while hunting, fishing or trapping on the land they own or lease. This exemption does not apply to land owned by a business, corporation or partnership unless the shareholders, partners, members or owners are comprised solely of the members of an immediate family and farm that land. Farmland means agricultural land that is devoted or best adaptable for the production of crops, fruits, timber or the raising of livestock, or is assessed as agricultural land for property tax purposes.
- Residents of Indiana engaged in full-time military service and who are carrying their leave orders and a valid Indiana driver's license or Indiana voter registration card.
- Non-resident military personnel on active

duty and stationed in Indiana may hunt or fish with a resident license.

- An individual who is younger than 13 years old; does not possess a bow or fire-arm; and is accompanied by an individual who is at least 18 years of age and holds a valid license.
- Youth participating in free youth hunting days.
- Non-resident landowner according to the exemption the non-resident's state provides for landowners that are Indiana residents. While hunting, the nonresident must possess proof of ownership (i.e., tax receipt) of the farmland. Owners of Indiana farmland, their spouses and children who live with them are exempt from license requirements while hunting or trapping on their land if they are residents of a state that allows an Indiana resident the same exemption in that state.

The following non-residents may obtain a resident license:

- Non-resident military personnel on active duty and stationed in Indiana may hunt or fish with a resident license.
- A non-resident younger than 18 years old may hunt, trap or fish with a resident license if a parent, grandparent or legal guardian is a resident.

Landowners who are residents from states that do not allow an Indiana resident the same exemption must have and carry a valid non-resident license to hunt any wild animal. All non-resident landowners are required to have a valid non-resident license when hunting on land other than their own.

The law does not exempt non-residents who lease land in Indiana. Non-resident lessees are required to purchase non-resident hunting and trapping licenses.

Persons with disabilities: An individual with a disability can apply for a special permit to use a method to take a turkey that is not otherwise allowed by rule, such as shooting from a vehicle. Rules for use of a Persons with Disabilities Hunting Permit and application forms are available from the Division of Fish and Wildlife, 402 W. Washington St., W273, Indianapolis, IN, 46204; (317) 232-4102 or at www.hunting.IN.gov.

Youth license: The resident youth consolidated hunting and trapping license, for resident youth 17 or younger, covers the annual resident hunting and trapping licenses, turkey licenses, game bird habitat,

Indiana migratory waterfowl, trout/salmon stamp privileges and all deer licenses. Non-resident youths 17 or younger may purchase the appropriate non-resident youth license: annual hunting, deer, turkey, or trapping. However, a non-resident under 18 years of age, who has a parent, grandparent or legal guardian who is a resident of Indiana, may purchase a resident youth consolidated license to hunt or trap in Indiana. All youth hunting licenses are valid for the designated license year, if the license was purchased when the individual was 17 and turned 18 during that year. In order to purchase a hunting license, anyone born after Dec. 31, 1986 must successfully complete a hunter education class offered by the DNR. See Apprentice license exception.

Apprentice licenses: An individual of any age, resident or non-resident, can buy an apprentice hunting license without having to take a hunter education class. An individual can purchase up to three apprentice hunting licenses, of any combination, in his/her lifetime before needing to complete the hunter education requirement.

While hunting, the apprentice hunter at all times must be in close proximity to and be able to communicate with a hunter who is at least 18 years old and has a valid hunting license (unless exempt from needing a hunting license). The individual who accompanies the apprentice hunter cannot accompany more than two apprentice hunters at one time while afield.

The apprentice resident youth consolidated hunting and trapping license includes the same licenses and stamps as the regular resident youth consolidated hunting and trapping license; it only exempts the license holder from needing to take a hunter education class.

Landowners or lessees of farmland and their children living with them who meet the requirements for hunting license exemptions also are exempt from needing an apprentice hunting license.

Season and Bag Limits:

Spring - The spring season is April 25-May 13, 2012. The bag limit is one bearded or male turkey for the spring season. Spring turkey hunting is allowed statewide.

Fall - The bag and possession limit for the fall seasons is one bird of either sex, regardless of hunting equipment used or what portion of the season. Fall archery season is statewide. Fall firearm season has specific dates for specific counties (see below or map on page 10).

- Fall archery (including crossbows): Oct. 1 – 28, 2012 and Dec. 8, 2012 to Jan. 5, 2013 - Statewide.

- Fall firearm: Oct. 17 – 21, 2012 in the following counties only:
 - DeKalb, LaGrange, LaPorte, Marshall, St. Joseph, Starke, Steuben.

- Fall firearm: October 17– 28, 2012, in the following counties only:
 - Bartholomew, Brown, Clark, Clay, Crawford, Daviess, Dearborn, Dubois, Fayette, Floyd, Fountain, Franklin, Gibson, Greene, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Jennings, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Morgan, Ohio, Orange, Owen, Parke, Perry, Pike, Posey, Putnam, Ripley, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Switzerland, Union, Vanderburgh, Vermillion, Vigo, Warren, Warrick, Washington.

Youth Season: Youth age 17 years or younger can hunt wild turkeys during a special season on April 21 and 22, 2012. The youth hunter may use any legal shotgun, bow and arrow, or crossbow. The adult accompanying the youth hunter must be at least 18 years of age, must not possess a firearm, bow and arrow, or crossbow while in the field, and must possess a turkey hunting license and game bird habitat stamp if participating in the hunt (i.e. calling turkeys) unless otherwise exempt from license requirements by state law (see pages 4 and

5). The youth hunter may take only one bearded or male wild turkey during the spring season, inclusive of the youth and regular spring turkey seasons. The youth must be properly licensed to take a wild turkey and comply with all tagging and check-in requirements.

Legal Equipment: Turkeys can be hunted only with:

- A 10-, 12-, 16- or 20-gauge shotgun loaded with pellets of size No. 4, 5, 6, 7 or 7½.
- A muzzleloading shotgun not smaller than 20-gauge and not larger than 10-gauge, loaded with pellets of size No. 4, 5, 6, 7 or 7½. Combination loads using shot sizes other than these are illegal.
- Bow and arrow
- A crossbow

Hunting Hours: Wild turkeys may be hunted only from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. All Fish and Wildlife Areas, Mississinewa and Salamonie lakes have spring season hunting hours one-half hour before sunrise until noon for properties on CDT and until 1 p.m. for properties on EDT. Call the property for additional information.

Tagging: A temporary transportation tag is no longer provided with the turkey hunting license. All hunters must immediately tag the turkey with a paper stating the name, the complete address, and the license number (if applicable) of the person who harvested the turkey; date the turkey was taken; and the sex of the turkey taken before transporting it from the field. The feathers and beard of a wild turkey must remain attached while the turkey is in transit from the site where taken. A sample turkey tag can be downloaded [here](#).

Checking: If you are successful in harvesting a turkey, you must have it checked at an official turkey check station within 48 hours of harvest or before leaving the state. While at the official turkey check station, you must attach a permanent transportation tag or seal provided at the check station. The tag or seal must remain on the turkey

until processing begins. [Link to check station site.](#)

Fluorescent (hunter) orange: Archery hunters must meet fluorescent (hunter) orange requirements while hunting turkeys December 8 - 23 and during Dec 26 - Jan.5. The minimum requirement is one or more of the following articles exposed at all times that are solid fluorescent orange – vest, coat, jacket, coveralls, hat or cap. Minimal logos or patches are allowed. Camouflage patterned orange garments do not satisfy the requirement.

Handguns: An individual may carry a handgun while hunting wild turkeys without a handgun license in accordance with IC 35-47-2-2.

While hunting wild turkey, it is illegal to use or possess: a dog; another domesticated animal; a live decoy; a recorded call; an electronically powered or controlled decoy; or bait. An area is considered baited for ten (10) days after the removal of the bait, but an area is not considered to be baited that is attractive to wild turkeys resulting from normal agricultural practices.

Harassment of hunters, trappers: It is illegal to intentionally interfere with the legal taking of a game animal by another person on public land, or on private land without permission of the landowner.

Hunting from a vehicle or boat: Animals may not be hunted from, by, or with the aid of any motor-driven vehicle or boat, except:

By authorized persons with a Persons with Disabilities Hunting Permit. To check traps that are set lawfully and maintained. To hunt any animal (except furbearers) from a motorboat; provided the boat is not under power derived from the motor.

Selling of wild game: Protected or regulated wild animals, live or dead (or the meat there from), cannot be sold, traded or bartered. (Exceptions: lawfully taken furbearers, squirrel tails, deer hides, antlers, hooves, and cured gamebird feathers may be sold).

Wanton waste: It is illegal to kill or cripple any wild animal without making a reasonable effort to retrieve the animal to include in your daily bag limit.

Shooting Across Roads or Waters: It is illegal to hunt, shoot at or kill any animal or to shoot at any object from within, into, upon or across any public road. It is illegal to shoot across a body of water, except in the lawful pursuit of wildlife.

Trespassing: It is illegal to hunt, trap, chase or retrieve game on private land without the consent of the landowner or tenant. Always ask permission before entering private property. A sample private landowner permission form is on page 12.

Turkey Hunting Safety

Safety Tips for Hunting Wild Turkeys

Wild turkey hunters are reminded to make an annual review of hunting safety tips as part of each season's preparation. Based on studies across the country of factors related to accidents occurring during the turkey hunting season, there are consistent variables.

The No.1 factor in most hunting accidents is the shooter failing to properly identify the target. The shooters and victims were more likely to be experienced hunters and were more likely to shoot their hunting partner than a total stranger.

Most incidents took place at 11-50 yards with approximately two-thirds occurring on private land. Shooters, on average were 45 years old with 30 years of hunting experience and 16 years of turkey hunting experience. Victims were 43 years old with 13 years of turkey hunting experience.

Indiana has not had a fatal turkey hunting accident in 41 years of turkey hunting. However, we still average one or two shooting incidents a year. The physical injuries can be serious and certainly the mental anguish extends to the victim, the shooter, the investigating officers, and all their families.

It is the responsibility of each hunter to help make our state one of the safest places to hunt wild turkeys. It is recommended that you make a copy of these tips, hang a copy up at camp, or keep a copy in your hunting vehicle. Most of all, review it frequently before and during the season.

Good Luck and Safe Hunting.

- Select a calling position where you can see for at least 50 yards in all directions and where you are protected from the backside.
- Whistle or shout to alert approaching hunters of your position. Never wave or stand up.
- Never sneak in on a turkey or use a gobbler call near other hunters. Never crowd another hunter working a bird.

- Never shoot at sound or movement.
- Use a flashlight when walking in the dark.
- Be aware of turkey "fever" and its prevention. Disregard peer pressure to bag a bird.
- Be extremely careful using turkey decoys.
- Do not wear red, white, or blue outer or exposed inner clothing.
- Make sure your headnet doesn't obscure your vision.
- Don't assume you are the only hunter in the area. Be certain of a companion's location.
- Know and identify your target and what is beyond before you pull the trigger or release an arrow.
- Discuss safety techniques with companions.
- Never assume that other hunters are responsible.
- Always keep your gun's muzzle pointed in a safe direction.
- Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
- Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- Always keep your gun unloaded until ready to use.
- Never climb a tree, a fence, or jump a ditch with a loaded gun or knocked arrow.
- Never use alcohol or drugs before or while hunting.
- Respect property rights and secure permission before hunting.

Fall wild turkey sex and age determination

If obvious leg spur, then bird is a male:

- adult male: 1/2 inch or longer
- juvenile male: less than 1/2 inch

If no obvious leg spur:

- use breast feathers to determine sex and wing tips to determine age (amount of barring and shape of 9th and 10th primary tips)

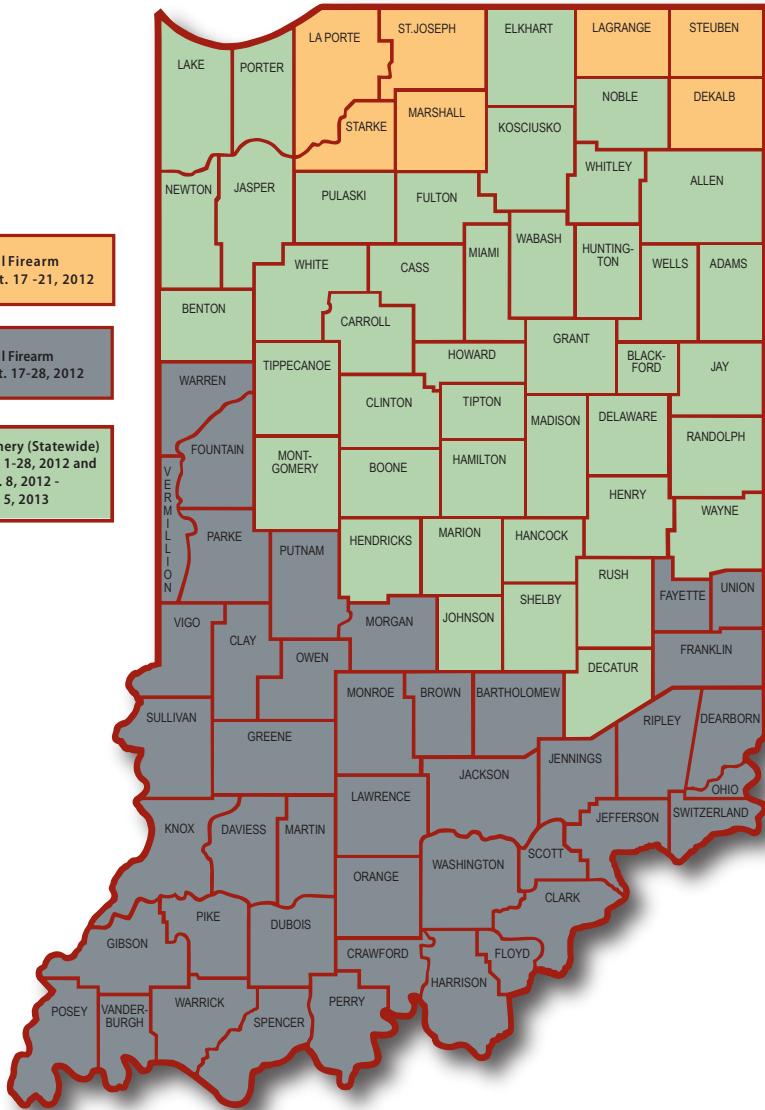

Outdoor enthusiasts hoping to fish or hunt on private land can use this handy Permission To Access Private Land form. The form is not required but should help landowners feel more comfortable when allowing hunting, fishing or trapping on their land.

The document provides landowners with an explanation of the laws regarding landowner consent and relief from liability when allowing hunting, fishing or trapping on their land.

The form also provides proof of permission to hunt, fish or trap on a listed property. The form should be completed and signed by both parties, and retained according to the instructions. Be courteous, safe and thoughtful when hunting, fishing or trapping on private land.

Permission To Hunt On Private Land Form

TO BE RETAINED BY THE HUNTER

According to IC 14-22-10-1, a person may not hunt upon privately owned land without having the consent of the owner or tenant of the land. According to IC 34-31-9, natural resource-based activities, including hunting and fishing, are considered agritourism activities, and an agritourism provider is a person who provides the opportunity for agritourism activities whether or not the participant pays to participate in the activity.

WARNING - Under Indiana law, an agritourism provider is not liable for an injury to, or the death of, a participant in agritourism activities at this location if the death or injury results from the inherent risks of agritourism activity. Inherent risks of agritourism activities include risks of injury inherent to land, equipment, and animals as well as the potential for you to act in a negligent manner that may contribute to your injury or death, or for other participants to act in a manner that may cause you injury or cause your death. You are assuming the risk of participating in this agritourism activity.

TO BE RETAINED BY THE LANDOWNER/TENANT

Under IC 34-31-9, you are not liable for the injury or death of someone participating in natural resource-based activities on your property if the death or injury results from the inherent risks of such activity. Inherent risks include risks of injury inherent to land, equipment, and animals as well as the potential for the participant to act in a negligent manner that may contribute to their injury or death, or for other participants to act in a manner that may cause their injury or death. The participant assumes the risk of participating in natural resource-based activities on your property.

The law does not prevent or limit the liability of an agritourism provider who has knowledge or reasonably should have known of a dangerous condition on the land and does not make the danger known to the participant, resulting in injury, damage, or death to the participant; or who commits an act or omission that constitutes willful or wanton disregard for the safety of the participant; or who intentionally injures the participant.
