Women have achieved significant accomplishments in medicine and science, yet comprise a relatively small proportion of faculty, especially at the highest ranks and positions of leadership. As a result, women faculty tend to have smaller professional networks than male colleagues and have fewer role models of success.

Dr. Joye M. Carter is the Chief Forensic Pathologist at the Marion County Coroner's office. In this position, she manages the post mortem examination side of the Coroner's Office, performing autopsies, providing expert testimony and overseeing a forensic pathology fellowship program. Dr. Carter was the first African American in the history of the USA to be named a Chief Medical Examiner in 1992 and first female to be named Chief Medical Examiner in the District of Columbia, State of Texas and the first female to be named as Chief Forensic Pathologist in Indianapolis, Indiana. She was also the Chief Deputy of the Armed Forces Medical Examiner department and was in charge of the military forensic fellowship program and provided education on forensic pathology to the federal government investigative bodies on a worldwide location.
